National Volunteers Week Fast Facts

- National Volunteer Week was first held in 1989
- National Volunteer Week 2010 will be held from the 10-16 May 2009
- The 2010 theme is Volunteering: Now, more than ever
- 5.4 million adults (34% of the population) do voluntary work each year*
- Volunteering continues to grow – in 1995 24% of the population volunteered, in 2000 32% and 2006 35%*
- Volunteers contribute more than 700 million hours annually*
- Strongest representative age group is 35-44 year olds*
- 50% of volunteers do so because they believe they are helping others*
- Volunteer rate is higher outside of capital cities (32% to 38%)*
- 36% of women volunteer whilst 32% of men volunteer*

National Volunteer Week runs from 10-16 May 2010 and is a great opportunity to recognise your volunteers. Volunteer recognition does not need to be a large cost to your business. Here are some simple ideas you may like to consider:

Volunteer Profile

Bob Cairns



Bob has volunteered all of his adult life. He has been having been a member of Wangaratta Rotary and was involved with primary and secondary schools when his children were students. He also is involved with St Patricks church and is a life member of Apex.

In 2009 Bob decided to seek out some new opportunities and registered with Community Skillsbank as a way to find new areas to volunteer. Through his registration with Community Skillsbank, Bob has linked into new opportunities that meet his interests and time commitments. "I volunteer for Red Cross as a Patient Transport driver, as well as Anglicare where I have helped with delivery of Christmas hampers."

"I have driven a bus in support of volunteer activities and plan to drive a bus again for The Centre during January 2010" advised Bob. Just hearing a thank you from the person you have helped is enough, but if this doesn't happen it doesn't change the dynamics – you have still helped them and that is what it is all about. At present I am fitting my volunteer activities around part time work but when I have totally retired I will continue to volunteer in whatever capacity I can as I believe volunteering helps to

Corporate Volunteering



McDonalds is a well recognised franchise in Australia and the world through its leadership in the hospitality industry. What is little known about McDonald's is the strong commitment to give back to communities which flows right down to our local McDonalds stores.

We caught up with Kym Bourke who is the community relations representative and McCafe Supervisor in the Yarrowonga, Wangaratta, Corowa and Cobram stores. Kym explained that McDonalds nationally believe it is important for us to support communities and we carry this strong belief into our local region. Our Licensee is passionate in his belief of community connection and supported the development of my role as community relations representative in order to focus on this area. In November of each year the Yarrowonga, Wangaratta, Cobram and Corowa teams pull together for McHappy day where money from every Big Mac sold is donated to Ronald McDonald House. The focus of Ronald McDonald House Charities (RMHC) is to improve the health and well being of seriously ill children. McDonalds carry this out by creating, finding, operating and supporting programs that help seriously ill children and their families while they receive medical treatment, and assist recovering children return to normal life.



Ronald McDonald Houses are attached to major women or children's hospitals and provide a 'home-away-from-home' for seriously ill children and their families. McHappy day involves community volunteers and emergency service staff getting behind the counter to help raise money and gives staff the opportunity to invite their own families into the store to see what happens behind the scenes. Management take their support one step further by attending the Gala ball each year. More than \$420,000 was raised on the night in 2009 with 100% of this going towards RMHC programs in Victoria.



So how do McDonalds support our communities?

- Each of the stores have a large cordial cooler which is offered free to borrow in support of local community groups
- A major sport focus in our local communities is supported through the donation of healthy choice meal awards for awards and encouragement of participants in their sporting clubs
- The same meal awards are supplied to schools in our community to encourage our youth to achieve in their studies
- Throughout the year McDonalds donate their merchandise and meal vouchers in support of fundraisers fetes and fundraisers in the community
- McDonalds also on occasion respond to personal tragedy and challenges that individual residence experience in their community
- McDonalds sponsor local groups. In 2009 they sponsored local kids from a special school to attend and compete in a basketball competition. They sponsor a local bike group, cars at the speedway and the local stores are a major sponsor of a car in the Variety club bash which raises money and is dedicated to inspiring hope and improving the lives of children
- Staff and management donate their time to volunteer in clean up Australia each year
- Emergency services is another area our local stores are very committed to supporting. Each September they hold the drive thru challenge where \$1 from every car through the driver through in the designated hour is donated to our local police. McDonalds offer discounts for emergency service members and respond to community and volunteer need in times of emergency

Mentoring Opportunities

Mentoring is where one individual provides support, encouragement and information to another, based on their knowledge, life and experience relative to the mentoring theme. Mentoring often provides a two-way learning experience for both mentor and mentee, which can encourage deep satisfaction and numerous benefits in many areas.

We have great opportunities to engage in our local community through some fantastic mentoring programs in our region, here is a snapshot for you to consider:

Benalla Region

Mentoring young men 16-25 years of age. Mentors are required to be involved in a range of activities designed to develop a strong rapport between mentor and mentee with the aim of a continuing relationship. Activities are carried out on monthly basis for approximately a 6 month period. Activities will include outdoor and adventure activities as preferred by young men in the target group. Mentors will be matched preferably on a one to one basis. Working with Children's check will be required.

Greater Shepparton and Strathbogie region

Volunteer mentors are needed to assist young people who have a disability, to explore options for employment, education and community participation. Mentors meet with their young person for 8 one hour sessions. There is also a group activity part way through the program, and a certificate presentation event is held at the end of the program to celebrate the achievements of young people and their mentors. Training and a mentoring manual is provided, and activities are guided by the interests of the young person. Mentors are supported by a Project Officer.

Wangaratta Region

Volunteers provides mentoring services to young people (7-17 years) in need of additional adult support. Volunteer mentors spend regular face-to-face time with young people for a minimum of 12 months, but often much longer. Working with Children's check will be required.

East Ovens and Murray Region (Alpine & Towong)

Volunteer Mentors encourage a young person's success in school and life. Volunteers support a young person through an on-going, one-on-one relationship, serving as a positive role model and encouraging the young person to build self esteem and motivation.

Training Opportunities

Working with Children Check

The Working with Children (WWC) Check is an initiative of the Victorian Government and is administered by the Department of Justice. The WWC Check helps to protect children from sexual or physical harm by checking a person's criminal history for serious sexual, serious violence or serious drug offences and the persons history with specific professional disciplinary bodies for certain findings. The introduction of the WWC Check creates a mandatory minimum checking standard across Victoria for adults to engage in child-related work as defined in the *Working with Children Act 2005*.

Grant Information

Volunteer Grants 2010

If you would like to apply for the Volunteer Grant you will need to be quick as applications close at 2pm AEST on Friday, 16th April 2010.

What is Volunteer Grants 2010?

Volunteer Grants 2010 recognises the valuable work of Australia's volunteers and is part of the Government's ongoing commitment to supporting volunteers, assisting disadvantaged communities and encouraging social inclusion to assist vulnerable people within our society. Funding of \$21 million is available to eligible non-profit community organisations to assist their volunteers and encourage volunteering.

Volunteer Grants 2010 provides funding between \$1,000 and \$5,000 to help non-profit organisations to:

- Contribute towards the costs of training courses for volunteers and/or
- undertaking background screening checks for volunteers; and/or
- Purchase portable, tangible, small equipment items to help volunteers; and/or
- Contribute towards fuel reimbursement for their volunteers, including those who use their cars to transport others to activities, deliver food and assist people in need.
